CT Travel Programme Overview


- → Launched: in May 2019
- → Donors: The Netherlands, EU, USA, Qatar, Australia, Japan, India, Germany and Hungary
- → UNOCT's global flagship initiative with partners: CTED, UNODC, ICAO, OICT, INTERPOL and IOM assisting 76 Member States
- → Objectives: To support Member States in building their capabilities to detect and counter the movement of terrorists and serious criminals by collecting and using travel information and enhancing information exchange, in accordance with Security Council resolutions 2178 (2014), 2396 (2017), and 2482 (2019), international standards and relevant privacy laws.
- **→** Comprehensive assistance provided on:
- ✓ Needs assessment
- ∠ Legislative assistance
- Set-up of a Passenger Information Unit and delivery of training
- Establishing carrier engagement and connectivity

- (i) 41 countries received assessments since Programme launch;
- (i) 40 roadmaps, and 1 regional workplan with CARICOM, developed since Programme launch;
- 4 national consultations on API and PNR in 2024; and
- (i) 4 Regional Informal Working Groups in Eastern Europe, in Southern Africa and in West Africa and Southeast Asia

- Obligation to provide API and Passenger Name Record (PNR) data

- Collaborative work of UN bodies



2482 (2019)

- Nexus between terrorism and organised crime
- Use of INTERPOL databases



CT Travel Programme is building applications that will allow the ingest and exploitation of API data from maritime carriers and from other transport modes. This will enable efficient and comprehensive border management.













Bespoke interfaces for all maritime sectors are being developed – suitable for all shipping sectors. Maritime API will be processed in the PIU with other API – enabling broken travel to be identified.
